FINDINGS

Pursuant to the provisions of the Alabama Environmental Management Act, Ala. Code §§ 22-22A-1 to 22- 22A-17, as amended, the Alabama Air Pollution Control Act, Ala. Code §§ 22-28-1 to 22-28-23, as amended, the Alabama Department of Environmental Management (hereinafter, the “Department” or “ADEM”) Administrative Code of Regulations (hereinafter, “ADEM Admin. Code R.”) promulgated pursuant thereto, and the federal Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. 7401 to 7671q, *as amended*, the Department makes the following FINDINGS:

1. Bill Patterson Construction, Inc. (hereinafter, “BPCI”) operates a debris pit on property located at latitude/ longitude (30.5400, -87.600) in Robertsdale, Baldwin County, Alabama (hereinafter, the “Site”).

2. The Department is a duly constituted department of the State of Alabama pursuant to Ala. Code §§ 22-22A-1 to 22-22A-17, as amended.

3. Pursuant to Ala. Code § 22-22A-4(n), as amended, the Department is the state air pollution control agency for the purposes of the federal Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. 7401 to 7671q . In addition, the Department is authorized to administer and enforce the

provisions of the Alabama Air Pollution Control Act, Ala. Code §§ 22-28-1 to 22-28-23, *as amended*.

4. ADEM Admin. Code r. 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)1 states that "...open burning must take place on the property on which the combustible fuel originates."

5. ADEM Admin. Code r. 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)3 state that "The burning must be controlled so as to avoid creating a traffic hazard on any public road, street, or highway as a result of the air contaminants emitted."

6. ADEM Admin. Code r. 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)7 states that "The fire shall be attended at all times."

7. From March 23, 2021 to April 5, 2021, the Department received multiple complaints regarding unauthorized open burning being conducted at the Site.

8. On March 25, 2021, the Department was contacted by the Robertsdale Fire Department concerning a large debris fire at the Site.

9. During a March 25, 2021 Site inspection, Department personnel observed a large fire producing smoke that obscured road visibility. At the time of the inspection, there were no on-site personnel monitoring the fire.

10. During an April 29, 2021 Site inspection, Department personnel noted that the fire was still smoldering.

11. On April 29, 2021, the Department issued a Notice of Violation (NOV) to BCPI regarding the unauthorized open burning. The NOV was returned to the Department June 2, 2021 as unclaimed. On June 11, 2021, the Department re-issued the NOV to BCPI that requested a written response be received by the Department no later than July 11, 2021. As of this date, the requested response to the NOV has not been received.

11. Pursuant to Ala. Code § 22-22A-5(18)c., *as amended*, in determining the amount of any penalty, the Department must give consideration to the seriousness of the violations, including any irreparable harm to the environment and any threat to the health or safety of the public; the standard of care manifested by such person; the economic benefit which delayed compliance may confer upon such person; the nature, extent and degree of success of such person's efforts to minimize or mitigate the effects of such violations upon the environment; such person's history of previous violations; and the ability of such person to pay such penalty. Any civil penalty assessed pursuant to this authority shall not exceed \$25,000.00 for each violation, provided however, that the total penalty assessed in an order issued by the Department shall not exceed \$250,000.00. Each day such violation continues shall constitute a separate violation. In arriving at this civil penalty, the Department has considered the following:

A. SERIOUSNESS OF THE VIOLATION: BCPI allowed unauthorized open burning of imported vegetative debris that obscured road visibility and disrupted living conditions of surrounding homeowners due to the large amount of thick smoke for an extended period of time. The Department considers these violations to be serious.

B. THE STANDARD OF CARE: There appeared to be no care taken by BCPI to comply with the applicable requirements of the ADEM Admin. Code rs. 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)1, 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)3, and 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)7.

C. ECONOMIC BENEFIT WHICH DELAYED COMPLIANCE MAY HAVE CONFERRED: BCPI likely derived an economic benefit by not legally disposing of the imported vegetative debris.

D. EFFORTS TO MINIMIZE OR MITIGATE THE EFFECTS OF THE VIOLATION UPON THE ENVIRONMENT: At the time of the initial violation, there

were no efforts by BCPI to mitigate possible effects of these violations upon the environment.

E. HISTORY OF PREVIOUS VIOLATIONS: BCPI has no previous history with the Department for violating the Open Burning Regulations.

F. THE ABILITY TO PAY: BCPI has not alleged an inability to pay the civil penalty.

G. OTHER FACTORS: The Department has carefully considered the six statutory penalty factors enumerated in Ala. Code § 22-22A-5(18)c., *as amended*, as well as the need for timely and effective enforcement, and has concluded that a civil penalty herein is appropriate (*See* “Attachment A”, which is hereby incorporated into these Findings).

ORDER

Based upon the foregoing FINDINGS and pursuant to Ala. Code §§22-22A-5(10), 22-22A-5(12), 22-22-5(18), and 22-28-18, *as amended*, it is hereby ORDERED:

A. That, not later than forty-five days after the issuance of this Order, BCPI shall pay to the Department a civil penalty in the amount of \$40,000.00 for the violations cited herein. Said penalty shall be made payable to the Alabama Department of Environment Management by certified or cashier’s check and shall be submitted to:

B. That, immediately upon receipt of this Order and continuing thereafter, BCPI shall ensure immediate and future compliance with ADEM Admin. Code rs. 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)1, 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)3, and 335-3-3-.01(2)(b)7.

C. That, should any provision of this Order be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction or the Environmental Management Commission to be inconsistent with Federal or State law and therefore unenforceable, the remaining provisions hereof shall remain in full force and effect.

D. Except as otherwise set forth herein, this Order is not and shall not be interpreted to be a permit or modification of an existing permit under federal, State or local law, and shall not be construed to waive or relieve BCPI of its obligations to comply in the future with any permit or other written direction from the Department.

E. That, issuance of this Administrative Order does not preclude the Department from seeking criminal fines or other appropriate sanctions or relief against BCPI for the violations cited herein.

F. That, failure to comply with the provisions of this Administrative Order shall constitute cause for commencement of legal action by the Department against BCPI for recovery of additional civil penalties, criminal fines, or other appropriate sanctions or relief.


