

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The Department also undertakes a number of non-regulatory initiatives to improve the quality of life for the people of Alabama.

9 One initiative that has had increased in 10 emphasis in recent years is a program to reduce 11 litter, especially in areas where it can enter

waterways. Alabama reportedly has more miles ofwatercourses than any state in the continental

14 United States. We have a lot to protect.

15 Litter in waterways is not a temporary problem.

16 Litter can float to distant locations. Often it

17 sinks and stays on the bottom or becomes

18 embedded in the mud or sand. It accumulates and

19 takes decades, generations, or longer to

20 degrade. Litter is a problem throughout the

21 nation. The Alabama Department of

22 Transportation tells us they spend \$8 million

23 per year removing litter from highways.

Page 15 Controlling litter is primarily a matter

of education. Individual communities have varying degrees of success in controlling

4 litter. ADEM is expanding statewide efforts to

5 both educate the public and promote control

6 technologies. A few of these are: Watershed

7 awareness signage along the interstates in

8 Alabama. You may have seen the green signs with

white lettering notifying drivers when they are

10 entering each of the eight major watersheds in 11 the state and reminding them to help keep our

waters clean. Funding was obtained primarily to

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13 through competitive grants.

Another involves large eye-catching sculptures of wildlife native to Alabama that contain recyclable materials being installed at interstate rest areas. Funding for these was also made possible from another competitive grant.

20 This slide shows the 10 foot by 16 foot 21 sea turtle sculpture being installed at the

22 Grand Bay I-10 rest area welcome station in

Mobile County. There will be a total of eight

sculptures depicting wildlife found in the part

of the state where the rest area is located.

Anti-littering education materials displays
are planned for each of the interstate rest area
lobbies in Alabama.

ADEM is providing "no littering/no dumping" signs to the municipalities throughout the state to reinforce the message. As you see here.

At the last Commission meeting, I notified you of a pending \$1 million dollar grant. That competitive Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act grant was awarded to the Department to construct litter traps around Mobile Bay and the Alabama coastal area. As you can tell, we are pretty good at winning competitive grants. This grant will be used to put this litter control technology where it is most needed without depending on the availability of local funding. A specific focus will be on low-income and disadvantaged communities.

During swim season many citizens and tourists are interested in water quality at

1 beaches where recreational water activities

occur. The Department monitors water quality at

3 25 public beach locations in Mobile and Baldwin

4 Counties and uses site signage as well as our

5 website to post results. Coastal program

6 personnel take roughly 800 coastal water samples

each year.

In conjunction with the Alabama Department of Public Health, the samples are analyzed for indicator bacteria and on-site signs with interchangeable green, yellow, or red placards are used to notify beach goers of the latest water quality results. As you see here. Most often this information is needed after rain events.

In addition to the user-friendly green, yellow, and red placards, the signage posted at these public beaches also directs the public on how to obtain the latest website information quickly on beach and other water quality data elsewhere with QR code, an internet address, and toll-free telephone number.

The non-point source 319 program is another

non-regulatory program designed to improve water 1

- quality. It is called the 319 program because 2
- states participating in the program receive 3
- funding under Section 319 of the Clean Water 4
- Act.

6 As the name implies, it addresses pollution that is not attributable to a 7

- regulated point source. Reducing pollution such
- 8 9 as pathogens from pasture land, nutrients from
- 10
- agricultural fertilizer applications, and
- sediment from some storm water runoff is the 11
- 12 target of the program.

13 Here is a common site where you see both

- 14 stream bank erosion causing siltation pollution
- 15 and ready access for cattle in the stream
- resulting in pathogens entering the water. The 16
- non-point source program helps address this type 17
- 18 of situation.

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- 19 The non-point source program is a
- 20 non-regulatory program that reaches out to the
- 21 agricultural community and others to educate
- 22 them on better pollution control practices. It
  - also provides technical and monetary resources
    - Page 19
- to help implement specific pollution control 1
- projects. From 2014 to 2020, ADEM worked with 2
- 3 various groups to develop and implement \$28
- million in 17 watershed management projects to 4
- 5 control non-point sources of pollution.
- Non-point source pollution control, although 6
- voluntary, has increasing participation and has
- 8 enormous potential to improve water quality.
- Unauthorized dumps or UADs, recycling and 9
  - scrap tires are somewhat related to the litter
- problem. These three programs have both a 11
- 12 regulatory and a non-regulatory component. On
- 13 the regulatory side, the improper or unpermitted
- 14 disposal of waste is addressed with enforcement
- action. The non-regulatory initiatives of the 15
- 16 Department include: Utilizing a portion of the
- 17 \$1 per ton fee on each ton of waste deposited in
- 18
- landfills to clean up unauthorized dumps where a
- viable responsible party cannot be identified 19
- and therefore regulatory action cannot be taken. 20
- 21 570 unauthorized dump sites have been cleaned up
- 22 through this non-regulatory program.
  - Utilizing another portion of the \$1 per ton

- Page 20 landfill fee we provide grants to municipalities
- 2 to promote recycling. Approximately \$1.5
- 3 million per year in recycling grants are awarded
- to municipalities. These grants have helped 4
- 5 increase the voluntary recycling and waste
- reduction rate from 5 percent in 1989 to more 6
- 7 than 25 percent today.
- Another initiative utilizes a portion of 8
- 9 the \$1 per tire fee on each new tire sold in
- 10 Alabama to clean up scrap tire dumps where a
- viable responsible party against which a 11
- 12 regulatory action can be taken cannot be found.
- Regulatory and non-regulatory efforts in Alabama 13
- 14 have cleaned up dumps containing 11 million
- 15 scrap tires.

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- Another portion of that \$1 per tire fee is
- utilized to promote the beneficial use of scrap 17
- tires. One example of this activity is the 18
- 19 development of a very promising program
- 20 involving a public/private partnership to bale
- 21 tires at landfills within a given radius, then
- 22 sending them to a central location where the
- 23 private sector partner shreds the tires. This
- 1 activity is to generate more supply of shredded
  - 2 tire material. The shredded material is then
  - sold to end-users. The Scrap Tire Fund 3
  - purchases the necessary equipment. The revenue 4
  - from the finished product sales pays the private
  - sector partner for the cost of operations 6
  - 7 including the cost to incentivize the delivery
  - of scrap tires to the landfills plus the
  - 9 opportunity to generate a profit.
  - 10 An additional objective of the scrap tire
  - 11 program is to generate demand for scrap tire
  - material through demonstration projects. A 12
  - 13 project underway is the use of the rubber
  - 14 modified asphalt to pave 4.8 miles of roads in

  - 15 the two State parks. Developing both supply and
  - 16 demand is necessary to create an ongoing viable 17 method to deal with scrap tires.
  - 18 Formally developed sites with potential
  - 19 contamination are known as brownfield sites.
  - 20 Often the sites are abandoned and are frequently
  - 21 in prime areas for redevelopment. State and
  - 22 Federal environmental regulations typically do
    - not require clean up of these sites, so the

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- State Legislature promulgated the statutes to 1
- offer incentives for returning these properties 2
- to productive use. ADEM administers a 3
- non-regulatory voluntary cleanup program. Some 4
- 5 of the provisions and results are: Following
- cleanup, new and previous owners are protected 6
- from environmental liability from ADEM 7
- 8 enforcement actions. Tax benefits, including
- partial property tax abatement, are available to 9
- those redeveloping the property. 10
- To date, the Department has made 11
- 12 \$3.4 million in low-cost loans available to help
- 13 with the cleanup.
- 14 Communities benefit from rehabilitating
- derelict properties, promoting the 15
- revitalization of nearby properties, and 16
- 17 improving community image and quality of life.
- 653 brownfield sites have been identified in 18
- Alabama. This initiative has received increased 19
- emphasis in recent years. As of today, more 20
- 21 than 500 of those 653 sites totaling 9,400 acres
- 22 have been cleaned up or enrolled in this
- 23 non-regulatory program.

- 1 Aging infrastructure is a well-documented problem in our nation and in Alabama. From a 2
- 3 regulatory standpoint, ADEM is intimately
- involved with the problems caused by aging 4
- 5 drinking water and wastewater infrastructure.
- For many years the federal government
- 7 through EPA has provided funds to states for the
- 8 purpose of offering low interest loans to
- drinking water and wastewater systems for needed 9
- 10 upgrades to these aging systems to avoid
- regulatory action. The Drinking Water and Clean 11
- 12 Water State Revolving Fund or SRF non-regulatory
- program makes sure public water and wastewater 13
- systems have access to affordable funding. 14
- 15 The SRF programs make low cost funding
- available to public drinking water and 16
- wastewater systems in Alabama. They focus on 17
- small and disadvantaged systems with limited 18
- access to other funding. 19
  - Since 1999 the Drinking Water SRF program
- has made more than \$500 million in loans. 21
- Since 1989 the Clean Water SRF program has 22
  - made more than \$1.2 billion in loans.



The Guidelines for Public Comment are used in the application of ADEM Administrative Code 335-2, Environmental Management Commission Regulations, Rule 335-2-3-.05, Agenda and Public Participation. The Guidelines for Public Comment serve to educate and inform the public as to how the Commission interprets and intends to apply the Rule. The revised Rule 335-2-3-.05 was effective October 7, 2016.


