These proposed amendments consist of administrative corrections and clarifications in response to EPA comments on the Department's Total Coliform Rule and Public Water System Well Design requirements. In addition, the revision would allow for electronic delivery of consumer confidence reports (CCRs). The Department held a public hearing on the proposed amendments on May 13, 2016.


